Lucy S Acrobatic Gymnastics



Deputy Principals' Report

SENIOR CAMPUS

HSC Analysis 2021

I had the pleasure of presenting an analysis of our HSC results from 2021 to the P&C in May at the first face-to-face meeting we have had in a very long time. We are so proud of the cohort of 2021 – an entire term of lockdown learning, modified 'online' Trial exams, and then the uncertainty of not knowing whether the HSC exams would even go ahead, and when, meant that this cohort of students faced even greater challenges than those in 2020, the first year affected by the pandemic. They showed such incredible resilience and empathy for one another, and this sense of cohesion definitely bolstered their success. Another complicating factor was the fact that approximately half of the cohort had received early entry offers to university, and in many cases these were unconditional offers that did not require them to obtain a nominated ATAR score. While this was wonderful at relieving the pressure on them, the offers, combined with the uncertainty around the HSC exams, definitely impacted motivation for a large number of students.

I noted at the P&C meeting that the interpretation of HSC results is fraught and multi-faceted. Media reports often focus primarily on the 'Leagues Table' of schools, where schools are ranked based on the proportion of Band 6/E4 (the highest achievement level in a subject) out of all exams sat. It is important to note that this metric does favour selective schools and other schools that are able to control their intake and are less likely to cater for a diverse cohort, as we do in comprehensive public schools. It also encourages schools to encourage students to do 'easier' courses where they may be more likely to achieve a top band result. The Leagues Tables do not reward schools that value and promote holistic achievement (which is not to say, of course, that the schools that achieve highly on the Leagues Table do not value holistic achievement), and do not reveal the extent to which a school is able to support all students to achieve their personal best. It is also important to note that a school's position on the Leagues Table has no bearing on an individual students' HSC result or ATAR.

The key indicator of success for us as educators is the extent to which we have been able to add value to a student's performance throughout high school – for us to know that students have achieved better in the HSC as their NAPLAN performance would have indicated that they should. On this scale, I am pleased to report that our 2021 cohort exceeded our expectations and demonstrated excellent value-added growth.

We also had some outstanding individual results. Zack, our 2021 School Captain, achieved an exceptional ATAR of 99.8. He was an All Rounder, achieving top band results in 11 units, and a Top Achiever, coming 8th in the state in Economics. Zack was also awarded a Co-Op Scholarship for UNSW in Accounting and Business Management. Hannah also achieved an ATAR of 98.15 and has commenced a Bachelor of Politics, Philosophy and Economics at ANU, and our other school captain, Kelsey, achieved an ATAR of 97.7 and was also awarded a Co-Op Scholarship for Medical Engineering at UNSW. Our talented artist Phil J was featured in the Art Gallery of NSW as part of ArtExpress, and Will, one of our accelerated Society and Culture students, achieved a mark that placed him in the top 200 students of the candidature.

We saw some outstanding subject results in the HSC as well, including in Society & Culture where the cohort exam mean was 8.75 marks above the state mean. Excellent results were also evident in subjects as diverse as Software Design & Development, Legal Studies, PDHPE and Modern History. All of our faculties are currently undertaking a detailed analysis of the HSC results for their subjects and amending their planning and programming as a result. NESA provides extremely rich

information to schools after the HSC, including a breakdown of cohort performance in each exam, question by question. All of our Stage 6 teachers have spent time deeply engaging with this data in order to build teaching and learning experiences for the 2022 cohort that will ensure even greater success.

Communicating with Students While at School

At Cammeraygal we pride ourselves on our adherence to a strict 'no mobile phones' policy for all students from years 7 to 12. This includes not using Apple Pay at the canteen and not using phones in the classroom. Unfortunately, we have recently seen an increase in the number of students who are communicating with their parents via their mobile phones throughout the school day. This is often when students are not feeling well, and they contact their parents (either surreptitiously in class or by doing so in the bathrooms) to ask them to come and collect them. Parents are then emailing the school or arriving to collect these students without the prior knowledge of the office staff.

Our procedure for when a student is unwell is that they ask their teacher to go to sick bay (a request which is always granted) and they are accompanied by another student down to the front office. The office staff ask the student whether they will feel better after a short rest, or whether they would like for us to contact their parent or carer to either collect the student or seek permission for them to be able to leave school on their own, if they are well enough. Our office staff are all wonderfully kind caring, and will ensure the student is comfortable and warm while they wait. They prioritise contacting parents immediately in this situation – this is why it is always important to answer calls from unknown numbers while your children are at school, as it may be the school. We would appreciate your support with this.

If your child contacts you while they are at school, please discourage them from doing so and reinforce that they should go to sick bay. Our 'no phones' policy is the envy of many other schools and allows our students to be free from pervasive social media pressures while in class, and the distractions to all that come with unfettered phone use. This can only be successful with the support of all members of our community, and we do rely on you as parents to assist us in this.

Uniform

As is often the case when the weather gets cooler, we have seen some problematic uniform behaviours creeping in to the senior years. In particular, a number of students have been wearing their Cammeraygal Sports P&C hoodie to school, in spite of signing an agreement upon purchasing that this is not to be worn at school. Students who wear these or any other non-school hoodies and jumpers at school will have them confiscated until the end of the day.

Student Passengers

Under no circumstances should any senior student be riding as a passenger in a vehicle driven by another student during the school day, including during study periods or while offsite for recess or lunch breaks. Students who may be driving to and from school should not be using their cars during the school day without express permission from a parent in the form of a letter or email to the school, which needs to be signed by the Deputy at the beginning of the day.

LIBRARY



BEYOND NOW APP: SUICIDE SAFETY PLANNING Safety planning helps people reduce their immediate risk of suicidal behaviour. It involves the person – ideally with support from a health professional – identifying coping and help-seeking strategies that are tailored for their needs, situation and personal relationships. Beyond Blue developed the Beyond Now app to help individuals make their own safety plan to support them through times of sadness or grief. They can make it on their phone and carry it with them to access anywhere and anytime. 
Uniform Committee

ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABLITY

Air Quality Monitoring Project Warringah Freeway Upgrade/ Western Harbour Tunnel - Environment Protection Authority (EPA)

It was great to meet with the NSW EPA (Environmental Protection Association) and the DPE (Department of Planning and environment) last week to talk air quality monitoring in the North Sydney area.

Why is air quality being monitored?

Because of years of community advocacy (including from Cammeraygal High School) in relation to the Warringah Freeway Upgrade build, and the building of the Western Harbour Tunnel. The years that it will take to construct these toll roads and build the unfiltered twin exhaust stacks (approx. 600m from Cammeraygal HS Senior Campus) that will directly impact the quality of the air in the densest school zone in Australia.

Already works have commenced on upgrading the Warringah Freeway. Contracts have yet to be awarded for the Western Harbour Tunnel. For the health of children in the area it is hoped that the Warringah Freeway Upgrade can remain a stand alone project. You may consider writing to your local member if you feel this should be the case.

The good news is that the EPA and DPE are partnering to monitor air quality around the Warringah Freeway Upgrade/Western Harbour Tunnel which is the first of its kind in terms of construction stage monitoring.

What is involved?

You may have seen the central monitoring station go in at Cammeray Park, it is pictured below. This is connected to a network (10 in total) of particle sensors from Wollstonecraft to Middle Harbour that are called **KOALAs - Knowing Our Ambient Local Air-Quality**

The smaller KOALA units that are linked to the Cammeray Park monitoring station are located at Anzac Park Public School, Beauty Point PS, **Cammeraygal High School – West Street**, Community Garden, DPI Fisheries, Greenwich PS, Middle Harbour PS, Northern Nursery School and North Sydney Girls High. To see the 10 locations and live pollution readings that are updated every hour visit http://warringah.sensors.net.au.

We certainly look forward to some rigorous assessment and action on air quality on the Lower North Shore.

The Willoughby Environmental Protection Association (WEPA), which is a community-based group lobbying and educating locally to protect the environment, has asked that a further 2 KOALAs be erected at **Cammeray Public School and Neutral Bay Public School**, as we suspect these schools will also be impacted by the scale of the works already underway.

I will certainly be keeping a close eye on the results and how they are interpreted along with fantastic groups such as WEPA, our local school communities and local precinct/progress associations. There is a lot at stake – most importantly the quality of the air we breathe and the health of our children. 
