SENIOR CAMPUS

Year 10 Camp

Firstly, I wanted to acknowledge the students in Year 10 who attended camp last week. It was a wonderful opportunity for our students to experience the power of outdoor education in a safe, supportive environment.



On the banks of the Colo River, one of the most pristine rivers in NSW, students engaged in a range of activities to strengthen their connections with their peers, undertake challenges, and enhance their skills in a new setting. In small groups, students camped overnight in tents, cooking their food for dinner and working in teams. Students benefitted from experiencing a range of activities from hiking, canoeing, kayaking, raft building, rock climbing, abseiling, high ropes, archery, a relaxing float down the river in an inflatable tube or the muddier experience of an obstacle course on the shore. The teachers and I were so impressed with the cohort's can-do attitude, problem solving ability and care for one another.

Year 10 Assessments

We have been so impressed with the grade's work ethic coming back from camp as they have completed a variety of assessments this week. If students are away for assessment tasks, parents/carers are to contact the Faculty Head Teacher on the morning the task is due to explain the illness/misadventure. In the Year 10 Assessment Booklet, there is a copy of the "Year 10 Illness / Misadventure and Non-attempt Form" and this should be returned to the class teacher (or Faculty Head Teacher). Students should be prepared to submit / attempt the task on the first day they return to school.

Additionally, technology issues are not valid ground for misadventure. As such, students should be encouraged to:

- always complete work before the deadline.
- back-up files regularly;
- print out copies of drafts and keep them while the assignment is in progress.

More information about late submissions and assessment tasks in Year 10 can be found in the Assessment Booklet. The booklet also features the schedule of assessments for each course which will assist in planning and preparation for tasks.

If students are concerned about how they will approach their assessments, they are encouraged to seek assistance from their class teacher, the Faculty Head Teacher, as well as members of the Wellbeing Team including the Year Advisor, Head Teacher and Student Support Officer.

Wednesday Sport

Aboriginal Studies

Coal Loader excursion

A few weeks ago, a group of year 9s,10s and 11s had the privilege of meeting with Professor Dennis Foley, one of the last surviving men of the Cammeraygal clan, at the Coal Loader in Waverton. He spoke about the importance of skin names, connection to country and the value of oral history. He also expressed the importance of certain rituals like the coming-of-age ceremony for men in society. In order to prove themselves, young boys would take part in dangerous warrior training - such as riding on a whale's back, as depicted in a stone carving at Ball's Head. When we first got to the park, Professor Foley cleansed the area with a smoking ceremony and gave an important welcome to the Country. After that, he painted ochre which consists of crushed rocks, and water, the girls received three dots on their temples and the boys a stripe on their wrists. He generously shared his personal experiences as a member of the stolen generation and reinforced the value of acknowledging the culture and history of Aboriginal Peoples and how it shapes many aspects of our society today. Overall, the experience enriched our knowledge of the Cammeraygal Peoples and helped us to understand the complexities within and across Aboriginal societies.
